Moorwood Sough near Cliffe Stile Mine, Stoney Middleton. Driving of the sough is thought to have begun soon after 1780 (Rieuwerts, 2007) and it has had a major impact on the natural karst drainage systems in the area, capturing flow from sinking streams at least as far away as Swevic House Swallet near Foolow, 4.9km to the northwest of the sough tail. In addition, part of the groundwater flux into Milldam Mine, about 1km west of Swevic House Swallet, is discharged from Moorwood Sough. [Model: Katie Eavis.]
